
You are invited to reflect on the specific UN Sustainable Development Goal assigned to your team.

Each team has a **facilitator**. Her/his role is to keep the discussion thread and monitor the timing.


The expected result of the team's work is a Sketchnote drawn on the piece of puzzle you have received, representing the output of your discussion

- Please keep in mind these suggestions:
 - Dedicate half of your time (ca. 11:30 12:30) to discuss and generate ideas. Take notes, write down and sketch during the discussion;
 - o From 12:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. create the draft of your Sketchnote
 - After lunch, you will have another 30 minutes (from 2p.m to 2:30 p.m.) to finalize your Sketchnote and plan what to say during your presentation (max. 5 minutes each). The Facilitator will keep the notes of the Presentation.



WHAT IS A SKETCHNOTE?

Sketchnotes are as much a method of notetaking as they are a form of creative expression. Sketchnotes don't require high drawing skills, but do require a skill to visually synthesize and summarize via shapes, connectors, and text.. This is an example of a Sketchnote:



How to create a Sketchnote:

- Draw a draft copy of your Sketch on a piece of paper.
- When you have the final version, you can start drawing on your piece of puzzle
- Draw your Sketch using exclusively the black felt tip pen.
- WAIT UNTIL YOUR BLACK DRAWING IS COMPLETELY DRY!!
- Then use the color felt tip pen to draw the shadows.
- Use the Visual Vocabulary for inspiration.
- A Sketchnote is made 50 % of drawings and 50% of text
- Keep your Sketchnote inside the frame
